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## ARTIST'S STATEMENT

Growing up in Charleston, I've been surrounded my entire life by Lowcountry landscapes, like marsh grass, Spanish moss, and architecture steeped in hundreds of years of history. Iron work is an integral element in many of the historical homes here. I draw inspiration from my surroundings and enjoy working with clients who have a connection to the natural elements of the Lowcountry, like cattails, grasses, and palm fronds, and I want these things worked into their designs. I derive so much of my creative energy from organic landscapes of all kinds.
My designs are always based on a few things: first, what makes the client tick stylistically? Do they love architectural and modern, classic and traditional, or more of a natureinspired look? Second, what is the surrounding environment, including both the existing architecture and landscape? Lastly, how can I merge their design sensibilities with my own, and create something truly unique?
